

Ed Heuer Elementary School named one of the "Best Public Elementary Schools" for 2024

In early March, Ed Heuer Elementary School was awarded the designation as one of U.S. News &World Report's "Best" Elementary Schools in Wisconsin for 2024. This award was granted based upon Math & Reading proficiency & performance scores. Congratulations to the families, students, and staff of Ed Heuer Elementary school!



Ed Heuer Elementary School Prepares for Act 20

Act 20 (Science of Reading Training), which was created to provide better reading instruction for beginning readers in the Badger State, was signed into Wisconsin State Law on July 19, 2023. Under Act 20, all Wisconsin Kindergarten through Grade 3 teachers will need to commence professional training from the Center for Effective Reading Instruction's list of accredited independent teacher trainings by July 1, 2025. In addition to the training component, Act 20 mandates that the state of Wisconsin hire 64 additional reading coaches to serve public schools statewide. Furthermore, districts will also need to purchase new elementary-level English and Language Arts textbook series that adhere to Act 20 guidelines.

How does this impact Ed Heuer Elementary School? Building-level leadership is currently in conversations with our regional educational partner, CESA 5 in Portage, to determine training and textbook series options. Both training programs and textbook series will be selected, and the 40 hours of professional training for each of our elementary teachers are scheduled to begin this summer. Act 20 is a broad, historical initiative that will take a great deal of planning and professional development at each school district statewide. Ed Heuer Elementary School's staff will work together throughout its implementation to provide the best possible outcomes that we can for our students and families.

Visual Arts Classic

This school year, Port Edwards School District Art Teacher Mrs. Natasha Mentch formed the first John Edwards High School team to compete at the Visual Arts Classic (VAC). The VAC is a state-wide competition for high school art students. It is comprised of eight regional competitions during the months of February and March, with a culminating state-level competition held in Madison.

On Friday, March 1st, Mrs. Mentch took 11 JEHS students to the regional competition at U.W.-Stevens Point. All of our students did fantastic; 7 of the 11 students who participated in the regional competition scored high enough to move on to the state competition, which was held on Monday, March 25th.

Notes from the Nurse

We all recently turned our clocks forward for "Spring Ahead" which makes the evenings feel longer and brighter but can also make going to bed and getting up for school harder. Sleep is crucial to students' healthy growth and development and plays an essential role in their academic success. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) estimates that sleep problems affect 25-50% of children and 40% of adolescents. While children ages 6-12 need 9-12 hours of sleep, students ages 12-18 still need 8-10 hours of sleep to perform at their best.

Some parents turn to supplements such as melatonin to help with their child's sleep habits. Interestingly, a sharp rise in poisonings among children has accompanied this surge of melatonin use. Additionally, because melatonin is classified as a supplement, it is not strictly regulated by the FDA, meaning there's little to no oversight into what companies put into their products. This means that the accuracy of the dosing may be off and other substances (such as CBD or serotonin) may be added. Experts have also raised concerns about melatonin having an affect on children's growth and development, particularly during puberty.

Currently the AAP recommends using melatonin only short term to help children who have trouble falling asleep. Melatonin should NOT be used as a substitute for establishing healthy sleep habits that will ultimately lead to less difficulty falling asleep and a higher quality of sleep long term.

Healthy sleep habits include:

- Having a set bedtime and wake-up time (and not straying more than an hour from that even on weekends)
- Stopping screen time at last 60 minutes before bedtime and not allowing students to have devices in their room
- Getting regular exercise, but not with in 1 hour of bedtime
- Keeping the room cool and dark

Keep in mind, these strategies are also helpful and effective for adults as well! As always, please reach out if there is anyway I can assist you or your students!

Ticks Are Here

The department of health services if reporting that ticks are thriving months ahead of pace due to the record breaking warm winter we had. Ticks are at least 1 month ahead of schedule with their activity than typical years. It is unknown at this time if tick activity has reached its peak yet or if that is yet to come. As ticks become more active, so does the prevalence of Lymes Disease. Reported cases have doubled in the last 15 years. If you do get bit by a tick - remove it by pulling upward with constant/firm pressure, removing the entire thing. Take a picture of the tick before disposing of it and watch for symptoms of illness including joint pain, fever, fatigue or a rash. Seek medical care for treatment if you develop any of these symptoms.

A message from Port Edwards Parent Organization


