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

Public School Funding in Wisconsin & Port Edwards

On Wednesday, February 15, Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers released his proposed biennial (2023-25) budget for the state of Wisconsin. One of the key takeaways is that Wisconsin now holds its largest financial surplus in state history: Wisconsin will have an estimated \$7.1 billion financial surplus by July 1, 2023. Several important state programs, which have seen their financial support frozen or reduced over the past several years, could benefit from this historic surplus - one of them being Wisconsin's public schools.

How are Wisconsin's Public Schools funded?

Wisconsin's schools are funded with a combination of local, state, and federal revenues. The amount of each of these tax sources varies from district to district, depending upon property value and other characteristics of the district. Local and state revenues combined make up approximately 80% of a district's funding source, while federal revenues and local fees account for the remaining approximately 20%.

What is the funding issue that Wisconsin Public Schools are facing?

In 2002, Wisconsin ranked 11th in the United States in per-pupil funding for its Kindergarten -Grade 12 students. Over the course of the next 18 years, the Badger state slipped from 11th in 2002, to 25th in 2020 (Wisconsin's annual per-pupil spending increases during this 18 year period was only less than two other states).

To compound the issue of reduced aid increases, the 2021-23 Wisconsin state budget froze perpupil revenue limits on schools, which placed a hard cap on the dollar figure that school districts could utilize from both local property taxes and general school aid. Although one-time federal funding during COVID helped to offset this freeze to some degree in a number of state school districts, this money was a one-time "stop-gap", and will disappear completely in 2024.

How have Wisconsin Schools responded to the school funding issue?

In order to address the 20+ years of relatively stagnant state-level funding, Wisconsin school districts have asked its local taxpayers to pay for the remainder of needed revenues by exceeding the local property tax limit through school referendums, during either the April or November election.

On the November, 2022 voting ballot, Wisconsin school districts held 81 referendums: 39 of them were capital referendums (used to fund construction and maintenance projects), and 42 were operational referendums (used to fund day-to-day operations and staffing).

Funding for the Port Edwards School District

The Port Edwards School District has not been immune to stagnant state funding. In April, 2019, Port Edwards Schools asked its local taxpayers to exceed the revenue limit through a five -year referendum, at a cost of \$600,000 annually. This money has been used very carefully in each area of our district, to maintain a quality educational program for our families. Some of the areas that the referendum monies have addressed include: maintenance of academic programs, necessary building and grounds work (repairs or replacements of roofs, parking lots, school vehicles, heating systems, masonry, etc.), and increasing costs for transportation, utilities, food, and staffing.

This five-year referendum which district voters approved will end in 2024. Although Wisconsin school districts are hopeful that additional money will be provided as a result of the current state budget surplus, the increase will not be significant enough to offset the last 21 years of stagnant funding combined with the rising costs associated with operating a successful, viable 21st century school system. Additionally, Wisconsin's public schools do not

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anticipate a significant change in the formula by which schools are currently funded by our state government. As a result, we anticipate that state funding will continue to be either stagnant, or continue to fall further behind other states, for the support of our schools. With that in mind, initial planning has started in preparation for an April, 2024 Port Edwards School District referendum, for the continued operations of our school district.

For decades, the Port Edwards School District has proudly held the reputation in Central Wisconsin as a district which provides a high-level of individualized instruction, as well as academic and co-curricular programs which prepare its students to be highly successful upon graduation. However, like most other Wisconsin School Districts, Port Edwards is scheduled to face a severe financial "cliff" in 2024, as both federal COVID relief and 2019 referendum funding expires. Please continue to read future editions of the Blackhawk Bulletin, as plans for the April, 2024 school referendum continue to develop.

In high school, these tests qualify high school students for college, tech schools, and make them eligible for scholarships. Other test results assist us in curriculum planning and goal setting at the department level, in the classroom, and individually. Please take a minute to read the messages sent informing you of your child's testing dates and times. We appreciate having everybody in school, rested, and feed, ready to put 100% effort in their test. If students require make up tests, they miss other valuable class content.

The counseling office is also creating the 2023-2024 school schedule for middle and high school. This becomes a more challenging task as we offer an abundance of opportunities for our students such as dual credit classes, MSTC classes, youth apprenticeships, and Going to Work. While we encourage students to be an advocate for themselves, we also ask that you support and guide them in this important decision making. Procedures and deadlines are constantly being updated and it is extremely important to read them and ask questions if you need clarification.

As we turn the calendar to March, we start our third trimester. Students start a new schedule, spring sports begin, the forensics teams compete, the music department prepares for spring concerts, and drama organizes their variety show. There are endless activities while graduates also prepare for commencement. Check the PESD calendar for dates and times on these activities.

Child Find is a continuous process of public awareness activities, screening, and evaluation designed to locate, identify, and refer as early as possible all young children with disabilities and their families who are in need of an Early Intervention Program (Part C) or Early Childhood Special Education (Part B) services of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). If you have any questions or concerns about the development of your child between the ages of 3-5 years of age, please feel free to contact us at any time and we would be happy to help you find the appropriate resources for your child.

Have an enjoyable and restful spring break. Before we know it, summer will be here. Speaking of summer, please consider signing your child up for summer school this year. Elementary summer school is set for June 5th - June 23rd and open to any Port students currently in grades 4K-4. This year we have some new and exciting opportunities being offered during summer school, so keep an eye out for the brochure. Notes from the Nurse

Childhood and adolescence is the time for young people to develop healthy habits which will jumpstart a healthy life. Unfortunately, the number of students reporting poor mental health is increasing. In 2021, 1 in 3 adolescents reported poor mental health and 1 in 5 students reported contemplating suicide. Children as young as 3 years of age are being diagnosed with anxiety and depression. Studies have shown a sharp increase in diagnosis of anxiety, depression and other mental health/behavioral issues starting at around age 6. We also know that children with one of these conditions are likely to have others.

Building strong bonds and connecting to youth can protect their mental health. Schools and parents can create these protective relationships with students and help them grow into healthy adulthood. One of the ways our school is partnering with families is by offering school based mental health counseling. Providers come into the building weekly to meet with students in a supportive and convenient environment.

At home, you can promote strong mental health by encouraging social connections, providing structure and boundaries for your student and by engaging in open and honest conversations about mental health. One way to get the conversation started may be taking advantage of the

many resources available on YouTube or in a podcast. "Mental Health Minute" is an initiative to educate people of all ages about mental health. The next time you have an extra minute, sit down with your student and seek out one of these platforms. It may be the most important minute of your day.

As always, do not hesitate to contact the health offices if we can assist your student or family!



Medication At School Reminder!

Unfortunately, we continue to have issues with medications being sent to school in inappropriate containers or with the assumption that students will self-carry and self-administer medications. As a reminder - our school board policy states:

Students are prohibited from possessing, using, carrying, or distributing in school or on school grounds drugs (medications) or other products which, even though not defined as a drug, are used or marketed for use for medicinal purposes, such as to relieve pain or to relieve the symptoms of an underlying medical condition (including aspirin, ibuprofen, dietary supplements, CBD oil products, etc.).

Simply put, medications must be locked in the health office, unless it is one of the few circumstances where it is approved that students may self carry/administer medications. Additionally, when completing a medication consent for your child, you are agreeing to the following:

- 1. Medication will be sent to school in the original manufacturer's packaging and be labeled with the student's name.
- 2. Medication will be delivered by parent/guardian.
- 3. Parent/guardian will maintain a sufficient supply of medication.
- 4. Parent/guardian will keep school personnel informed of new/changes with the medication.

Please help keep your student and others safe by adhering to our safe medication handling practices!



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2023-24 Kindergarten Registration Reminder

If your child is currently attending 4-Year-Old Kindergarten in Port Edwards, we have his/her registration and immunization records on file. Current 4K students do not need to register for 5K.

Once again, we will be offering this voluntary 2-1/2 hour program at the John E. Alexander South Wood County YMCA. Your child must be 4 years old by September 1, 2023 to be eligible for 4K.


