

P.E.S.D. Faculty begins curriculum alignment work

It goes without saying that for best results, it is always important to know every step of a journey in advance, if you want to arrive at your destination both on time and with the fewest obstacles.

Our children's public school education from grades Kindergarten - Grade 12 is like a journey over several years, led each year by the tremendous teaching staff at P.E.S.D. The Port Edwards faculty works tremendously hard to make sure that our children progress and grow each year socially

and academically, and that they are learning content that is approved by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction.

This school year, our administration and teaching staff, along with local Curriculum Specialist Dr. Kathi Stebbins-Hintz, are doing a "deep dive" into the Wisconsin State Academic Standards, to ensure that there are no gaps in our local curriculum, and to eliminate any possible redundancy in what is being taught. This local analytical process will have our teachers looking at all of their content areas in closer detail, which will help them to become better practitioners by gaining more in-depth knowledge about both their grade-level and subject matter content.

State of Wisconsin to Release annual DPI Report Cards

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction is scheduled to release their annual school and district level report cards on November 14. The annual report cards utilize many different types of data to determine and present academic growth, achievement, graduation readiness, and a number of other areas in an online report. Just as we don't gauge our children's progress with one sole measure (a report card), DPI report card experts frequently remind us that the report card presents areas based on raw data, but does not show the full measure of a school or a district's effectiveness. If you would like to view the most recent DPI report cards, which use data from the 2022-23 school year, please visit the P.E.S.D. website, and search for "School Accountability Report" under "District Information."

Winter in Wisconsin

One of the great things about living in Wisconsin is that we get to experience four very unique seasons each year. A downside to our winter season is, at times, hazardous road conditions and dangerous cold temperatures. If either of these occur on a normally scheduled day of school, P.E.S.D. will work as quickly as possible to make a determination about whether or not it is safe for travel. If school is canceled due to weather conditions, this will be communicated to families through TV (Channels 9 & 7, Wausau), the school district website, social media, and through the infinite campus communication system via text messages and/or emails to families. MIDDLE/HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

I have recently had parent questions about the Restorative Practices at the middle and high school. Parents have asked how behaviors are being addressed and what consequences are assigned. Another common question is, why is my child meeting with the peer or teacher they are having trouble with? Therefore, I thought it was a good time to review our practices of Restorative Justice. Our middle school and high school adopted the Restorative Practice 16 years ago.

Under Mr. Mancuso's era as principal, staff was trained and the school adopted the five principals of our program: Respect, Relationship, Responsibility, Reflection, and to Resolve (reintegrate).

Restorative justice focuses on resolving the issues, or repairing the harm, caused by the behavior. The goal is to restore harmony between victims, offenders, and the classroom. Restorative justice is used in schools to address the disrespectful behaviors and re-claim safe and comfortable classrooms for all.

Who participates? The "stakeholders" or primary parties affected. In school, this is usually the offender, the victim (often a peer or possibly a staff member) and the principal. While it can be difficult for students to come together, it avoids the 'he said, she said argument' which sometimes happens when interviewed individually. Restorative meetings allow the person who has been harmed to be heard and have their questions answered. It also gives the opportunity for the student who committed the offense to understand how their behavior impacted the victim and others. Finally, the goal of the meeting is to resolve (repair) the classroom/community to the state it was before the incident occurred.

When and if your child is in a restorative piece they will hear questions such as, "What happened, and what were you thinking at the time?" Then, "Who has been affected by what you have done? And what needs to be done to make this right?" Most importantly, "How can you/we prevent this from happening again?" At this time it is also important for the victim to have a voice in the acceptable outcomes and the plan of action. Finally, the staff member, often the principal, will develop the plan with all involved.

In majority of the restorative justice, here at the MS/HS building, all parties have been more than satisfied with their participation in the restorative intervention. Research has found that restorative justice helps reduce the frequency of offenses reoccurring in schools and focuses on repairing harm. Resolution often includes restitution and community service.

Sometimes in addition to the restorative practices, punitive measurements are also necessary and assigned. Similar to when you were in school these consequences could be detentions, privileges discontinued, and suspensions.

Please know while the schools primary goal is academics, we also are responsible for creating a safe environment and promoting a positive culture.

Notes from the Nurse

Welcome to November! It is hard to believe the 1st quarter of school is wrapping up and the holidays are right around the corner!

About 10 years ago, legislation was passed that requires schools to provide healthier meals for students. The law requires schools to serve fruits and vegetables daily, offer more whole grain options, and serve low fat milk. Many parents may remember the food pyramid and students are likely familiar with what a healthy plate looks like. In general, less information on healthy vs unhealthy beverages is provided to families, yet many of us are consuming these items on a daily basis. So, what is the best beverage? Water, of course, as our bodies are made up of nearly 60% water! The age old recommendation to drink 8 glasses of water is really no longer relevant. Water intake should be individualized based on activity I level, percentage of water taken in by food, the weather, etc.

After water, tea and coffee are the 2 most healthy and most commonly consumed beverages, and, drunk plain, they are calorie free and brimming with antioxidants and health substances. However, turn that coffee into a mocha and those benefits are dramatically less.

Low Fat milk and soy beverages are next in line. With the low calorie/high protein content, milk gives you a big bang for the buck.

Non-calorically sweetened beverages fall next in line. These diet drinks are a better choice than sugarsweetened soft drinks because they are lower in calories, but, because they may contribute to weight I gain suggests that they should be had as the occasional treat rather than as a daily beverage. Studies have suggested that the artificial sweeteners do not complete the satiety pathway in your brain, eventually causing you to consume more calories after drinking them.

Finally, caloric beverages with some nutrients (aka juice) and calorically sweetened beverages (soda) are the least recommended and are known to cause weight gain and development of Type 2 Diabetes.







