


Elementary School Programs that Build Community and Character Submitted by: James Bena, Superintendent & 4K-5 Principal



In addition to teaching foundational learning skills, the staff of Ed Heuer Elementary School (E.H.E.S) are always looking for ways to improve and make our school community more closely connected. With that as one of our primary goals, E.H.E.S. offers a number of programs outside of the classroom that help to grow student confidence, interpersonal skills and a sense of community.

Mrs. Elle Bogdan, 4th/5th grade teacher, organized the Ed Heuer Elementary School **Blackhawk Families** Program this year. Once a month, students in grades Kindergarten-5

meet for an all-school assembly in the gym to discuss that month's positive character trait (Kindness & Respect during September, Responsibility in October).

Following the assembly, students from each grade level are divided into small groups of 10-12, including students from each grade. A homeroom teacher leads the groups, where they participate in games and activites designed to help them get to know one another better while also learning about that month's character trait.





After several years of being inactive, the **Young Authors** Program is once again taking place at E.H.E.S. Young Authors is being organized in 2024-25 by 4th/5th grade teacher Mrs. Jessica Decker. Young Authors exists to teach student confidence in their writing as well as in public speaking and listening. Twice each month, all students and staff gather in the elementary library to hear two students from each grade level read a recently created piece of writing. Families of the readers are invited and encouraged to attend the event as well.

In addition to the two programs that were reintroduced this year, **Story Time** with retired Port

Edwards School District educator Mrs. Kathy McGrath continues to be a wellloved weekly tradition at E.H.E.S. Each Wednesday, from 11:00 - 11:45 in the elementary library, Mrs. McGrath leads fun, engaging activities for 3, 4, and 5 year-old students who are not in school. Activities that Kathy leads include the reading of popular children's books, sing-along time, puppets, nursery rhymes, and book checkout. All P.E.S.D. families who have children ages 3 - 5 are invited to join Kathy at Story Time for an enjoyable and educational program!

Notes from the Nurse

Fall is officially here and the colors in central Wisconsin are gorgeous!

Did you know that November is national smoking cessation and lung cancer awareness month? On the 3rd Thursday of November, the American Cancer Society hosts the Great American • Smokeout. On this day, people are encouraged to quit smoking, even if it's only for a short period of time.

While smoking cessation is an important piece of the puzzle, it is important for families to know that tobacco is changing, and the next generation of tobacco products don't look anything like a package of cigarettes. With sweet candy flavors and products designed to hide addiction in plain sight, it's tough for parents to recognize tobacco when they see it, and even harder for parents to talk to their teens about the damage these products can cause.

Up to 70% of Wisconsin teens report they feel stressed. Often times, that stress, anxiety or even depression is what causes teens to turn to vapes or other nicotine products which claim to relieve stress. Research has shown that nicotine and other addictive products found in vapes make those symptoms worse. When teens vape, they stress more—so they vape more. It's a dangerous loop that damages their mental health and can leave our kids with a lifelong addiction.

What can parents do to help prevent their teen from getting caught in this dangerous cycle? Experts recommend learning the products, understanding the industries tactics, talk to your kids about the dangers of tobacco and set a good example by living tobacco free. <u>SmallTalksWI.org</u> is a website with great resources to help you get the conversation started. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services has an entire page devoted to helping families learn the products. If you google "Tobacco is Changing - Learn the Products" - it is the first website that pops up. A flyer is also included in this newsletter for your convenience.

<u>Pertussis</u>

You may have heard from the county health department, or by word of mouth, about an uptick in the number of pertussis cases that were being seen around wood county. It appears that the initial outbreak (17 positive cases) have been treated and numbers are declining. Pertussis can begin with symptoms similar to a common cold: runny nose, sore throat, sneezing, low-grade fever and a mild, occasional cough and may progress to spells of explosive coughing that can interrupt breathing, eating, and sleeping. After a coughing spell, patients may make a loud crowing or "whooping" sound as they struggle to inhale air (hence the name "whooping cough") and may also gag or vomit. Persons may experience severe coughing spells for several weeks or months. To prevent the spread of illness, wash hands often, cover coughs, stay home when sick and ensure your family is up-to-date with vaccinations.

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Have you ever heard of the term, *Period Poverty?* Period Poverty is when someone does not have enough menstrual supplies (tampons or pads) during their monthly cycle. Studies have shown that this state of need significantly impacts student's mental health and school attendance.

Dr. Amy Falk and medical student, Erin Gruber, will be completing a needs assessment to better understand Period Poverty here in the secondary schools of the Port Edwards School District.

Your child will be invited to participate in this research study on Period Poverty because they are a student at Port Edwards who identifies as female. If you would NOT like your child to participate in this survey, please contact school nurse Katie Bortz by this date: November 15, 2024.

Your child's response to this survey will help us understand Period Poverty within Port Edwards schools and its influence on anxiety and class attendance. Data will be collected about the topics of period status, access to period supplies, anxiety levels, free and reduced lunch status, class attendance, and more. You can find a preview of their survey <u>here</u>.

The survey will take less than 5 minutes to complete. The answers to the survey are anonymous which means no names will appear or be used on research documents, or be used in presentations or publications. If we write about this study, your child will not be identified and their name will not be used in presentations or publications.

We are also interested in your response to this topic as a student's guardian. **If you would be willing to complete this survey <u>here</u>**, it would be greatly appreciated to better understand familial needs.

Watch Out for Kid-Tempting Candy Flavors

How tempting are tobacco flavors like cherry, grape, root beer float, and cotton candy? Very. In Wisconsin, 95 percent of middle schoolers say they wouldn't use an unflavored tobacco product. Despite new federal restrictions, these dangerous flavored products are still on the market:



Menthol

Menthol's cooling sensation and minty flavor make cigarettes, vapes, smokeless tobacco, and cigar products easier to use and harder to quit.



Flavored Disposables

Disposable e-cigarettes can deliver hundreds of sweet, addictive nicotine puffs. They're also cheap, widely available, and growing in popularity.



Flavored E-liquids E-liquids and refillable vaping cartridges hook kids with thousands of flavors, like graham cracker, popsicle, cherry limeade, and gummy bear.



Flavored Little Cigars and Cigarillos Sold individually or in packs ranging from two to 20 cigars, young people can get a sweet flavor fix for just a few dollars at the convenience store.



Flavored Smokeless Tobacco Minty or fruit-flavored smokeless products are often packaged in tins and pouches that look like candy. There are even nicotine toothpicks.


