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

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2022 Enrollment and the Effect on the District

Enrollment has an effect on many aspects of a school district, with the school funding formula being an item that is almost exclusively driven by enrollment. This has recently been an area of good news for the Port Edwards School District. As of the writing of this article, the enrollment of students in our seats is 446. Enrollment certainly fluctuates and for Port Edwards School District we experienced an increase of about 30% between September 2015 and September 2019. After two years of the COVID-19 pandemic, we still have more students attending our classes today than we did when compared to each year during the period from September 2012 to June 2018. While last year we experienced a

decline in enrollment due to the pandemic, this year our enrollment has rebounded.

While it appears that we peaked in enrollment during the 2019-2020 school year, it is evident that the pandemic has driven some drastic changes in enrollment across the state for the past two years. We continue to monitor our enrollment and look for trends. We know that currently the largest classes are in our middle school grades and that our smallest class is in our high school. In the middle school, the average enrollment is 39 students per grade level and in both the high school and elementary school the current average is 30 students per grade level. It is vital that as we emerge from the pandemic, we keep a careful watch on our early elementary grade levels, as enrollment at these levels will drive our state funding formula in the future. The chart below shows several items:

- The revenue limit that is established by the state funding formula
- The three year average enrollment used to set our funding
- The Department of Public Instruction calculated enrollment
- The actual number of students in the seats in September

Open enrollment has a significant effect on our enrollment. This year, over a quarter (approximately 27%) of our students attending in the District were open enrolled into the District. This is by far the largest percentage of students open enrolled into a District in Wood County. Our two closest neighboring districts have a much lower rate of open enrollment: WRPS 3.6% and Nekoosa 8.3%. Port Edwards School District for years has had fairly significant numbers of both students open enrolled into and out of the District. The District is bringing in through open enrollment over a quarter of the total student enrollment. At the same time, we are seeing about the same percentage open enroll out of our District. The vast majority of students who open enroll out of the District have never attended school in the District (approximately 88%). For funding purposes, we are not able to count students open enrolled into the District, so these students are subtracted from our enrollment totals, however we can add back into our total students that are Port Edwards residents but open enrolled out. This past fall we had 126 students open-enroll into the District and we had 126 students open enroll out of the District.

As we have seen more families move into the District, there are times when those families have chosen to keep their children enrolled in their original District. This is especially true when it comes to older children. To illustrate this, our current senior class of 2022 has 10 students open enrolled into the District and 17 students open enrolled out of the District. Only one of those students open enrolled out ever attended John Edwards High School and only one other student attended in Port Edwards at any other time. So, 15 of those senior students open enrolled out have never attended Port Edwards. Further, to illustrate the change in population in the District, when the current senior class of 2022 was in their 9th grade year, 11 students open enrolled in and only 9 students open enrolled out. At some point during their high school years, approximately 6 more students moved into the District, but attended school elsewhere.

Notes from the Nurse

Even though COVID is top of mind, it is important to remember that there are several non-COVID related illnesses going around. COVID or not, we need you to keep your sick children home. Here is a reminder of our district health protocols. Please keep your child at home if they have the following signs or symptoms:

An oral temperature of 100.4 or higher

(may return 24 hours after fever subsides WITHOUT using fever-reducing medication.)

Diagnosed communicable diseases (influenza, RSV, strep throat)

Multiple cold like symptoms that are disruptive to learning

(Including cough, congestion, sore throat, headache, thick green drainage from nose)

Unexplained rash resembling a contagious disease

Red/mattering/itchy/watery eyes

Vomiting/diarrhea within the last 24 hours

Unexplained extreme fatigue (sleeping in class)

Until child has been on antibiotics/other treatment of diagnosed illness for 24 hours

Sick At School: If your child becomes ill during the school day, a call will be placed to the parent(s) of the child to arrange for the child to be picked up. If the parents cannot be reached, we will attempt to contact the emergency contacts listed in Infinite Campus. We consider the child sick if they are running a fever, have a vomiting or diarrhea episode, are coughing enough to disrupt learning (for themselves or others around them), or if they are not able to participate in class due to feeling ill. If the child is not running a fever and has not vomited/ diarrhea, we will have the child rest and try to send them back to class. If the child is not able to return to class, we will attempt to contact the parent for pick up. It is very important that contact information is always current; please inform the office of any changes immediately. These precautions are important for the health of not only your child, but the health of other students and our staff as well.

Covid Corner

Effective immediately, the PESD is now able to test students, staff and their direct household contacts as well! Please utilize this service for your family as needed.

As a reminder, in order to make the process as smooth as possible for your family if/when the need arises for testing - please fill out the NOAH labs registration/consent form today!

Kindergarten and 4-year-old kindergarten registration for the 2022-2023 school year will take place February 14-18th. Registration materials are available on the website and can be emailed to melviti@pesd.k12.wi.us or dropped off at the Elementary School Office at 951 5th Street from 7:45 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. Students currently enrolled in the 4K program at the YMCA do not need to register for kindergarten. Guidance for Parents and Guardians

- Parents and guardians may complete open enrollment applications online at http://dpi.wi.gov/oe. The online application will be available from **Feb. 7 until 4 p.m. on April 29, 2022**
- Parents are limited to no more than three applications to nonresident school districts for each child during the open enrollment application period.
- Applications must be filled out completely and accurately. Contact the local school district office or the DPI if assistance is needed in completing the application.
- Parents may request enrollment in a specific school or program in the nonresident school district; however, enrollment is subject to space and other limitations and is not guaranteed.
- Parents may apply for their children to attend 4-year old kindergarten under open enrollment only if the resident school district also offers a 4-year-old kindergarten program for which the child is eligible.



File a 2021 Tax Return to Get the Remainder of Your 2021 Child Tax Credit

Many families got up to half of their estimated 2021 Child Tax Credit as advance payments last year. Here are three steps to getting the rest of your credit:

Step 1: Review Letter 6419

- You should have received this letter in January 2022 if you received advance Child Tax Credit payments in 2021.
- It shows the amount of advance payments you received and the number of qualifying children the payments were based on.
- You or your tax preparer will use this information to figure your remaining credit accurately.
- If you misplaced your letter, you can look up your information using the IRS's CTC Update Portal or Online Account.

Step 2: Claim the Rest of Your 2021 Child Tax Credit

- File your 2021 federal tax return and claim the Child Tax Credit, if you're eligible.
- Choose direct deposit if you're getting a refund. Make sure your bank account information is correct

Step 3: Get Paid!

- After you file your return, you can check on the status of your refund using the Where's My Refund? tool on IRS.gov or the mobile app IRS2Go.
- You can check within 24 hours of e-filing or within four weeks of mailing a return. Updates to the online tool are made daily, usually overnight.
- · To use this tool, you need your Social Security number, filing status and the exact whole dollar amount of your refund.

Important Information

- » Filing a tax return is the only way to get the remainder of your 2021 Child Tax Credit.
- » Electronic filing with direct deposit is the safest and fastest way to get a tax refund.
- » Many people qualify for free e-filing through IRS Free File or at a volunteer tax preparation site.
