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

Referendum Update

During the spring election of 2019, the voters of the District approved the following question on the ballot: Shall the School District of Port Edwards, Wood County, Wisconsin be authorized to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$600,000 per year for five years beginning with the 2019-2020 school year and ending with the 2023-2024 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of maintaining educational programs and paying for operational and maintenance expenses?

Some accomplishments from the spring of 2020 through the current date

and into the summer:

- 1. Replace roof section over JEHS/MS Music and Technology Education
- 2. Replace steps on the east side of JEHS/MS that are at the middle school hallway entrance
- 3. Replace carpet in the 1st/2nd Grade rooms at Elementary School
- 4. Replaced classroom curtains in Kindergarten/1st grade/2nd grade
- 5. Replace JEHS/MS library carpet
- 6. Update JEHS/MS computer system that controls heating system that feeds southwest part of the building
- 7. Installed additional upgraded cameras
- 8. Removed old flooring in MS Hallways/Art area and library
- 9. Removed obsolete heating unit and piping in the art room area
- 10. Removed old pipe wrap from art room, library and tech. ed. mezzanine and replaced with new wrap encased in hard plastic
- 11. Renovated MS hallway floors and art room floors with a polished concrete surface
- 12. Painted all MS/HS lockers, art room and library
- 13. Installed new signage throughout MS/HS building
- 14. Replaced ceiling tile in library and several classrooms...installed LED lighting in classrooms with new ceilings (light had already been done in library)
- 15. Replaced aging library furniture
- 16. Installed new classroom doors for the art room
- 17. Replaced sidewalk on south side of building that runs adjacent to tech. ed. and band
- 18. Removed aging sidewalk near 5/6 doors and replaced with pavement
- 19. Installed AC units in business education classroom, middle school resource room and MS/HS food service
- 20. Installed new dishwasher in MS/HS
- 21. Conducted tree trimming at MS/HS near track/football field
- 22. Installed new walk-in freezer at Elementary and cooler at MS/HS
- 23. Purchased new lawnmower
- 24. MS/HS library computer lab converted to a high-tech production lab vs. a word processing lab
- 25. New siding installed on press box with new sound system
- 26. Upgraded sound system in high school gymnasium
- 27. Purchased 3 Clevertouch Units to begin replacement of SmartBoards (now obsolete)
- 28. Purchased 6 wireless clocks to begin replacing failing school clock systems in both buildings
- 29. Cleaned and coated front cast lime steps at MS/HS in effort to prevent further degradation by salt and water
- 30. Landscape updates around buildings to create clean sight lines and cleaner appearance

Upcoming Spring/Summer of 2022

- 1. Social Studies Curriculum review and possible addition/change of some resource materials
- 2. Chemistry lab remodel—floors, cabinets, HVAC and ventilation, lighting, ceiling, plumbing and paint
- 3. New roof over Dorothy Alexander Auditorium/Chemistry with insulation added and rain gutters reinstalled
- 4. New carpet installed in 3rd grade/4th grade/5th grade classroom areas and new lighting
- 5. Possible Replacement of Main Gymnasium Outside Exit Doors---doors are rusting through on frames
- 6. Continued classroom ceiling and lighting replacement in MS/HS as feasible
- 7. Repair of the ELC (Environmental Learning Center) deck as deck is heaving due to freezing water issues


Continued in the future:

- 1. Continue with curriculum updates...Health, CTE, Art, Spanish, PE
- 2. Replace locker room doors through MS/HS facility
- 3. Replace many classroom doors that are delaminating
- 4. Replace some classroom carpets each year in MS/HS...may have continued asbestos to abate
- 5. Continue to replace fluorescent lighting in classrooms at MS/HS with LED lighting
- 6. Plan to renovate Elementary Gymnasium and possible solution to combination cafeteria/gymnasium...creates many scheduling issues to be dual purpose
- 7. Replace floors in music common area and tech. ed.
- 8. New ceiling in band area
- 9. Look to renovate other sciences labs...middle school and biology
- 10. Determine future for aging track
- 11. Replace MS/HS Generator
- 12. Add Elementary Generator
- 13. Continue to update HVAC systems in both buildings
- 14. Replacement of HVAC cooling tower at Elementary in near future
- 15. Continued tree trimming and tree maintenance at MS/HS and Elementary School

Thank you for your support of the Port Edwards School District, we are working to keep our curriculum updated, our facilities modernized and our students engaged. We are halfway through the five-year time span of this referendum and we will provide you with more updates as to the progress we have made on the initiatives we laid out during the time leading up to the passage of the referendum.

Speaking of our littlest Blackhawks, the Port Edwards School District is available to assist parents in need of early childhood screenings as well as provide information about resources in our community and the surrounding areas. Child Find is a continuous process of public awareness activities, screening, and evaluation designed to locate, identify, and refer as early as possible all young children with disabilities and their families who are in need of an Early Intervention Program (Part C) or Early Childhood Special Education (Part B) services of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). If you have any questions or concerns about the development of your child between 3-5 years of age, please feel free to contact us at any time and we would be happy to help you find the appropriate resources for your child.

Have an enjoyable and restful spring break. Before we know it, summer will be here. Speaking of summer, please consider signing your child up for summer school this year. Elementary summer school is set for June 6th - June 24th and open to any Port students currently in grades 4K-4. 2022-23 Kindergarten Registration Reminder

Plans are being finalized for the kindergarten class of 2022-23. By law, a child must be five years of age on or before September 1, 2022 to be eligible for kindergarten in the 2022-23 school year.

If you have not already done so, it is important that you log on to the website to register your child. You can email the forms to melviti@pesd.k12.wi.us or drop off at the elementary school office at 951 5th Street from 7:45-3:30. If your child is currently attending 4-Year-Old Kindergarten in Port Edwards, we have his/her registration and immunization records on file. Current 4K students do not need to register for 5K.

4-YEAR-OLD HALF-DAY KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION REMINDER



Once again, we will be offering this voluntary 2-1/2 hour program at the John E. Alexander South Wood County YMCA. Your child must be 4 years old by September 1, 2022 to be eligible for 4K.

Also, 4K classes will be offered at the following sites, subject to availability:

Building Blocks Learning Center, THINK Academy, Grant Elementary School, Grove Elementary School, Mead Elementary Charter School, St. Lawrence Early Childhood Center, Woodside Elementary, Humke Elementary 4K, and Head Start 4K (for Head Start students only).

Transportation will be provided within the Port Edwards School District. Parents must register in order for their child to attend. If you have not already done so, it is important that you log on to the website and fill out the forms. You can email those forms to melviti@pesd.k12.wi.us or drop them at the elementary school office at 951 5th Street from 7:45-3:30.

Technology Education Department PEEF Grant Updates

The Technology Education Department has benefited significantly from the generous grants from the Port Edwards Education Foundation (PEEF) throughout the past 7 years. We are happy to announce that the grants have benefitted the students, school, and community in a variety of ways. Below is a list of the grants received, along with a compiled list of many of the projects that we were able to achieve. We anticipate this list to grow significantly as time goes on.

3D Printer Grant: 2014-2015: A 3D Printer was purchased to teach students about prototyping within Engineering Courses.

- Each Engineering 1P student creates a custom 3D printed Keychain Flashlight.
- An Independent Studies Engineering student 3D printed a CO2-Powered Dragster
- Replacement parts for chairs and other items were custommade using the 3D printer.
- A student in Game Club printed a custom character for a game that they were playing.



CNC Router Grant: 2015-2016: A CNC (automated) Router was purchased to teach students about automation in manufacturing and to create custom projects with wood and plastics.

CNC Spindle Upgrade Grant: 2016-2017: A spindle motor upgrade was purchased for the CNC Router to make it run more efficiently.

- 300+ light-up name plaque boxes have been machined for 8th grade students, so they can learn about basic circuitry with a keepsake project.
- 50+ Cutting boards have had drip edges designed and machined into them by Woodworking 1 students.
- Pizza paddles and cup coasters were machined on the CNC router by Woods 1 students.
- 25+ Nightstand tops have had custom designs placed on them.
- Bow holders, gun racks, and coffee tables have been designed and machined by Woodworking 3 students.
- A working electric guitar was designed and machined by a Woodworking student, which gained social media attention nationwide.
- 2nd grade students came over to the High School to learn about manufacturing and saw a demonstration of the CNC router in action.
- Parents and community members have seen demonstrations of the CNC router during open house events.




- The Monarch Village enclosure (downtown) had the monarch, caterpillar, and name etched onto the eaves using the CNC router.
- A monarch silhouette was created for the monarch booth during the Village Festival.
- A moon bench was created for Prom.
- The Pumpkin Fest Sign in River Park (Nekoosa) was machined with our CNC router.
- An Eagle Scout Project was machined using the CNC router.
- 10 Adirondack Chairs were machined for the Current Issues Class to fundraise for the 100th Anniversary of the auditorium.
- The Kastner Gymnasium sign was machined by the CNC router and hung above the entrance to the gym.
- A set of buddy benches were created for the Elementary School.



Vinyl Cutter Grant: 2018-2019: A vinyl cutter was purchased to help students learn how to make custom designs and custom decals.

- 8th Grade students and Graphic Design 1 students design and run custom decals as a part of an exploratory project
- Over 100 square feet of vinyl has been turned into projects by students.
- Over 50 square feet of vinyl has been turned into projects for the school and community.
- Two FBLA students created custom decals to compete at their state event.
- A custom decal was created for the Elementary School Library for their book return cabinet.
- Vinyl Signs were created for the multiple access doors of the school.



- Decals were made for the Football team when they made Conference champs.
- Decals were made to denote the machines that were funded through PEEF Grants

Computer Upgrades: 2019-2020: The computers in the Technology Education Department had extra RAM (memory) and video cards purchased to make them run more efficiently with the various different softwares that we use.

- Students use the program Blender® to make 3D worlds and animations. This program takes a high-end computer to run properly, which the upgrade helped significantly with.
- Students use a game design software for the Video Game Design class, which runs much more efficiently after the upgrade.
- We were able to add an additional video game design software for Independent Studies Video Game Design students.
